

#### The Search For The Ancestral Home Of Peter McNulty 1807 - 1880

Peter McNulty was born in Ireland in 1807 according to the naturalization declaration submitted by him on November 22, 1842. In that declaration he stated that he migrated from the Port of Warring Point, Ireland on April 10, 1834. He reported that he landed at the city of St. John's, New Brunswick, Canada, and from there traveled to Boston, MA, arriving on June 8, 1834.



Through extensive research I found that the Irish port was actually Warrenpoint, located in Northern Ireland. Part of my research was done on the Internet which is a system which links computers from all over the world together into a common communication base.

I had asked for some help in locating the ancestral home of Peter McNulty and a gentleman from Northern Ireland responded. I had sent him what little information we had on Peter. We knew that he was born in Ireland in 1807; we suspected that he may have had a brother named Lawrence McNulty; we suspected that his parents may have been John McNulty and Anna.

Brian McAnulty (That is the way that McNulty was spelled in the early records.) from Rostreuor, County Down, Northern Ireland responded by making a copy of each weekly newspaper from Newry, Ireland for a period of four weeks in March and April, 1834. The reason that he selected Newry is that it is the nearest large city to Warrenpoint.

The only advertisement that fit is shown at left. Since it is difficult to read I'll restate it here.

"Now at Warrenpoint, for St. John's, New Brunswick, 500 tons burthen, The fast sailing and substantial built brig CUPID, Samuel Stephenson, Commander, To sail on the First of April."

"The Cupid is a fine new vessel, copper fastened, and well calculated for the Passenger Trade, being high and roomy between decks; and the owners pledge themselves to fit her up in the most comfortable manner for the accommodations of Passengers."

"For Freight or Passage, apply to the MASTER, on Board; or to James G. Quin, Merchants' Quay; Francis Caryill, Sugar-Island; Henry Blackham, Merchants' Quay. Newry, March 15, 1834".

Most of the advertisements stated that they would set sail on or about a particular date or first fair wind after a particular date.

Brian McAnulty wrote in his letter to me: "I am also waiting on conformation from parish records in Newry that John McNulty, the only one of that


name in the area, who lived at 87 Chapel St., Newry in 1830 had a son Peter and a Lawrence. If this is the case, their house is still standing and it should be easy to get original photographs from around your great great grandfathers time."

"The church from which Chapel Street gets its name was not long built when John McNulty would have died and therefore he would have been buried near the church itself. I have checked out headstones around the church and there is indeed a family plot for McNulty right beside the church. So if we get proof that John McNulty and Anna had sons of this name then we're on a winner. If not there are one or two other leads I can follow."

I sent a letter to New Brunswick seeking information on the ships record for the CUPID. I still haven't figured out how Peter McNulty traveled from St. John's to Boston, or what Peter did from 1834 until we find him in Wisconsin in 1838.

I'm working with Brian to zero in on details of our Irish roots, so stay tuned to this news letter for more information.

During the reception, Gary Heck found a new friend as is shown in the photo below. Hans, a







### New discovery on the Burgess side of our family...

At the end of October of this year I was on a four day business trip to Connecticut, Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Since I was so close to where my nephew, Steve Heck, lived I decided to take a day of vacation and spend a three day weekend with him at Norwich, Connecticut. I had a great time thanks to a super host.

On Friday, Steve took me on a tour of the Pfizer plant where he is a chemist in a research laboratory. I had a chance to meet with many of his coworkers and an opportunity to see some really sophisticated research facilities.

Following the tour we did some "island hopping" to Rhode Island. Our goal was to do some research into our Burgess family who lived in Little Compton, Rhode Island in 1668 through 1765.

At this point I'll show you the Burgess connection to me so you can figure out the connection to yourself.



Thomas Burgess (1668-1743) was born and died at Little Compton. His son John and grandson Benajah were also born at Little Compton. Our goal was to find the burial place of Thomas Burgess.

Steve and I found Little Compton to be a beautiful place laid out very much the way it was back in the 1600's. There was a Common which is where the local population fed their livestock and where the militia practiced marching. Today the Common

is occupied by a church and a cemetery with tombstones dating back to the late 1600's.

Many of the tombstones were made from a black slate stone which had delaminated over the past three hundred years. Reading the stones was very difficult and many of the inscriptions have been lost forever.



The church yard at Little Compton, RI


We found a section of the cemetery where there were a large group of people buried with the name Burgess. We tried to find a stone for Thomas Burgess (1668-1743) but didn't have much luck. We then went across the street to the local village clerk's office and were shown a card catalog for the cemetery. Steve found that Thomas Burgess was buried in 1743 in the 27th row of the cemetery.

We went back to the cemetery and started counting rows. It wasn't as easy as you would think because it seemed that they had a few half rows thrown in there. After counting and searching for quite a while we finally found the area where Thomas had to be buried. It was in the same area

Don and Sharon Heck had found a land record for John Burgess from 1787 indicating that he owned land at Voluntown. (A transcript of that record was published in Issue 7, December 1994, of Our Family


News Letter.) The record identified the location of

the land as being next to Smith's Mill in Voluntown. We checked at the Voluntown library and found out that Smith's Mill was located in the village of Oneco, CT, several miles north of the library. In 1787, Oneco was a part of Voluntown. A
