Anna Barbara Schaefer Heck Tombstone Project Completed

Thanks to the contributions from our many readers we were finally able to complete the tombstone project that we started in 2013. It all began when we discovered the burial place of Peter McNulty at the Saint Mary's Church cemetery in Dover, Racine County, Wisconsin. In August 2013, I had asked the Sextant responsible for the cemetery if he could help us locate the exact burial place of Peter McNulty. From the church records we knew that he was buried in an unmarked lot identified as lot four of the Thomas Morrow lot. My brother, Gary Heck, was actually the first person to find the burial location documented in the church sacramental records. Gary was a member of the parish and had access to the records.

On Saturday, September 14, 2013, I took my first cousin, Robert Jerome Heck, his wife Lorraine, and their daughter, Cheryl Ann on a cemetery tour of Racine and Kenosha Counties.



When we got to the cemetery at Dover, we were surprised to find that the burial place for Peter McNulty was marked with four little orange marker flags similar to those used by utilities to mark the location of buried power lines. The four of us talked about how sad it was that there

was no grave tombstone for either Peter McNulty or for Anna Barbara Heck. We thought that maybe we could start a project to mark their final resting places.

I had no idea of how much a tombstone cost so I started shopping around in Burlington, Racine, Milwaukee and on the internet. I soon found out that there were a bunch of regulations at each cemetery pertaining to the depth and size of footings as well as to the style and size of tombstones. For example I found that one cemetery required a footing 36 inches deep and eight inches longer and wider than the actual tombstone. Most cemeteries required a footing of 18 inches.

The prices of the tombstone were as high as \$2,000 for a stone 24 inch by 12 inch by 4 inches thick. The lowest price that I found was \$700. My cousin, Cheryl Ann Heck even suggested that we could dig and pour the 18-inch deep footing ourselves and save some money.

While searching the Internet I found a company in Union Grove, Racine County, Wisconsin owned by Gene Fox. I went out to Union Grove and talked with Gene about our project. Gene Fox was the former Sextant for the Saint Francis Xavier church cemetery at Brighton in Kenosha County, and he was also a local historian. Gene was so impressed with our project that he said that he would make and install the tombstones and do so at a price that was affordable. We put together sketches and agreed on the type of granite. He came up with a final price of \$464 each.

The first project was to put a tombstone on the grave of Peter McNulty at Dover. We presented our proposal to the Sextant and he gave us permission to proceed with the project. We had a lot more work to do to get approval to put a tombstone on the grave of Anna Barbara Heck's grave. The reason being that we had no idea of where she was buried. The church records from Saint Francis Xavier Church stated that she was buried in the church cemetery but the location was not indicated.

Gene Fox was a big help when he provided me with a detailed map of the Saint Francis Xavier Church cemetery. The map was especially helpful because it contained the location of all of the graves and the name of the person buried in each lot. It also marked the locations of those lots where the occupant was unknown.

The next step was to go through the church sacramental records and determine all of the people who died in 1854, 1855, and 1856. Anna Barbara Heck died in 1855. Armed with that list I was able to plot the location of each named person's burial lot on the map. The locations formed a tight circle in one area of the cemetery. One of the unknown spots was right next to my great-great-grandmother, Patience McNulty's grave.

It all made common sense. Anna Barbara Heck, who died in 1855, was the mother of Henry Heck. Patience McNulty, who died in 1894, was the mother of Henry's wife, Mary Ann McNulty. When Anna Barbara Heck died her husband, Johann Heck purchased two burial lots, one for his wife and one for himself. However Johann Heck remarried in 1856 and migrated to Minnesota in 1857. He is buried in Minnesota.


When Patience McNulty died in 1894, Henry Heck and his wife Mary Ann McNulty would have been responsible for her burial. Since the family owned the unused lot next to Anna Barbara Heck, they decided that would be a good burial spot for Patience.

I presented this theory to the Sextant and he agreed with my logic. He presented the theory to the Cemetery Board and they also agreed. The Cemetery Board presented it to the Parish Priest and he also agreed. The Sextant then gave us permission to have the footing and tombstone installed.

It gives me a warm feeling when I stand in front of the graves of my two great-great- grandmothers who probably never knew each other.

Epilog: On April 19, 2015, my wife Gloria and I drove to Brighton to see the finished project. We

were taking a few pictures for this newsletter. A bird had pooped on Anna Barbara Heck's tombstone. Gloria cleaned it up and was looking for a trash container. We saw one at the edge of the cemetery near the tombstone that Gene Fox had engraved for his family. When we got to the Fox family lot we were shocked to see a large mound of dirt indicating a fresh burial. There were wilted flowers with a banner on top of the mound. The banner stated "Husband and Father." We did a quick search on the Internet and found that Gene Fox, age 62 years, died unexpectedly and was buried at the Saint Francis Xavier Church cemetery a week earlier.



We were saddened to learn that Bob Merritt passed away on March 4, 2015 in Minnesota. Bob had been in ill health for several years. We will miss his smiling face at the family picnics.

Reminder: Heck Family Picnic Date Changed to July 12, 2015



There is always a lot to eat at the picnic where each family brings an item to share. The best part of the picnic is visiting with all of your cousins.






Bocce Ball is played on a field of grass and is usually played with teams. If you have never played the game, why not give it a try?

Cheryl has become quite the expert in reading old German script, picking up where her dad,

Robert Jerome Heck, left off. Her dad had studied Latin while in the seminary and spent many hours researching our family history.

In the early church records the surname was spelled Gutthoff. In later years it was recorded as Guthoff and even Guthof. The most common spelling was Guthoff.

Here is Cheryl's direct line of descent from her 8th great-grandfather.:

Note that those in bold text all resided in Wisconsin.

DNA Test Results...

I had my DNA tested in 2013 through the firm FamilyTreeDNA.com. Most of my family came from Central Europe, Germany and the Czech Republic but the DNA results indicated that there were a few that originated in Poland, Finland, Turkey, and Afghanistan. Since my mother was born in Moravia, Czech Republic, and the Heck and Henningfeld families originated in Germany it is not surprising to see Poland highlighted. Turkey and Afghanistan were

more of a surprise. Groups from Afghanistan, Iran and Turkey invaded Eastern, Central, and Western Europe many times over the past centuries. Russia defeated some of these invaders in the area of Finland.

My 1st cousin, Dan Mikel also had his DNA tested and his results were similar. His father, Bohumel Mikel, was the only brother of my mother. Dan does not have German ancestors so that means that the Turkey and Afghanistan connections were through our Czech ancestors.

Congratulations and a big Thank You For Your Service, to Ralph Heck, age 83, from Burlington, Wisconsin. Ralph and his wife Ruth are readers of this newsletter and have been for many years.

Ralph recently participated in a Stars and Stripes Honor Flight to Washington DC in which World War II and Korean War veterans are honored for their service. The veterans leave Milwaukee very early in the morning and return late that same evening. Participants are generally tired but very proud.

One of the events is a mail call during the return flight home. Participants are given cards and letters from family and friends and they get to read them while on the way home. One of the cards that Ralph received was from a 12 year old. The card read, "Dear Mr. Heck, Thank you for your service!! Mr. Heck, your sacrifice has saved my grandpa's life. If you hadn't helped Korea then my dad would have never made it to USA and never met my mom. So I personally thank you for saving also my life." It was signed, "Love, 6th

grader Andrew Jiang Hong, You are my family's hero."

New Ulm Weekly Review, New Ulm, Minnesota, 24 June 1885.

"Mr. John Heck of Granby, aged 76 years, died very suddenly last Sunday night (21 June 1885) at the residence of Vincent Brunner, in West Newton where he had gone to attend the wedding of his grandchildren. A stroke of apoplexy was no doubt the cause of his sudden demise."

Editor's Note: John Heck was known as Johann Heck and arrived in America in 1853, settling first at Brighton, Kenosha County, Wisconsin and residing in Brighton, Nicollet County, Minnesota.

New Ulm Weekly Review, New Ulm, Minnesota, 15 October 1919.

Mrs. Vincent Brunner.

"Saturday morning shortly after 2 o'clock Mrs. Vincent Brunner passed away at her home on North State Street. She had been ailing the past three years and had been confined to her bed the past five months. Death was due to weakened nerves and other ailments common to old age. Mrs. Brunner, nee Clara Heck, was born in Ahlendorf, (sic) Rhinish Province, Germany on July 18, 1843 and thus was seventy six years old when the Grim Reaper claimed her. She came to America with her parents (Johann Heck and Anna Barbara Schaefer Heck) when she was twelve years old and they lived for several years in Wisconsin.
