

Surrounded by his loving family, Richard J. "Dick" Heck Sr., age 87, passed away peacefully, Tuesday, August 25, 2015 at his residence. Dick was born in Racine, March 22, 1928, son of the late Clarence and Frances (Nee: Pier) Heck.

During the Korean War, Dick proudly served in the United States Army. Dick was united in marriage to the love of his life, Cecelia Mae Catrine on April 24, 1954 at St. Rita Catholic Church, where he was a long-time and active member. He was also a lifetime member of Roma Lodge, a 4th Degree Member of the Knights of Columbus, and a member of the Northside Businessmen Association. Beginning his career with his father and uncle at Keystone T.V. & Appliance, Dick carried on the family tradition for the next sixty-two years as owner and operator. A Tribute to Richard Heck by his granddaughter, Angela Maynard:

"The other day, we lost my grandfather, Richard John Heck, Sr. He was the strong, silent type; but when he spoke you knew it was important and listened. He was happy with the simple things; sitting in his chair watching Wheel of Fortune or the game, crossword scratch-off tickets, a glass of wine, playing cards with family and friends (canasta, bridge, sheepshead), making fudge, raking leaves for hours, washing dishes (from all the catering jobs), sitting on the dock with a fishing pole (whether fish were actually caught was inconsequential)."

"He has always been an important part of my life; from living with him and spending afternoons at his store when I was a small child to a strong, steady, always there, but never intrusive influence as I grew up."

"It has always seemed like Grandpa Dick would be around forever, loving and observing from his favorite chair. His rapid decline over the past month has been difficult to watch, but now he is at peace. After 87 years, he passed peacefully at home with the family that he loved more than anything."

"Don was preceded in death by his wife, Marjorie, in 2010."





Our Research into our Guthoff – Stratman ancestors just got harder.

Cheryl Heck and I have been researching our Guthoff and Stratman lines of ancestry for over three years. We made some great discoveries and we were able to zero in on an area near Hamm, Germany.



We found that our families lived in two small villages located right next to each other. One was called Westönnen and one was called Ostönnen. The villages were located south of Hamm and in between Werl and Soest.

Reciently we discovered that there were two other villages with similar spellings called Westtünnen and Osttünnen located just a few miles north between Rhynern and Hamm. We had been looking at Catholic Church records from Rhynern and were trying to figure out why members of our family would travel to Rhynern for services when there was a Catholic Church right in Westönnen?

What we found out was that there were Guthoff, Peiler, Duncker, and Schulte events that took place in Rhynern and in Westönnen.

Back to the drawing board...

Now we know that we have branches that don't seem to fit and we will have to revisit our notes.

Things to check on the Guthoff line.

4 Nov 1668 Antonius Gutthoff marries Anna Sodon.

Did they have a son named Joe Gutthoff? If so, Joe would have been 20-22 years old when his son Joannes Gutthoff was born.

If so, the line of descent would be as follows"

- 1. Antonius Gutthoff Anna Sodon (married 4 Nov 1668)
- 2. Joe Gutthoff Elisabeth Que (not married) (**Did they get married later?**)
- 3. Joannes (Joes) Guthoff Maria Kampschulte (married about 1718)
- 4. Angela Margaretha Guthoff Joes Henning (married 26 May1754)
- 5. Joannem Christian Guthoff Mariam Annum Duncker (married 20 Nov 1781)
- 6. Theodor Johan Heinrich Guthoff Johanna Anna Catharina Peiler (married 8 June 1817)

- 7. Anna Marie Elisabeth Guthoff Anton Stratman (married 19 Feb 1846)
- 8. Clara Stratman Henry Henningfeld (married 6 May 1873)
- 9. Margaret F Henningfeld Robert Steven Heck (married 15 Oct 1903)
- 10. Robert Gerald Heck Mary Ann Mikel (married 29 Jun 1935)
- 11. Robert John Heck Gloria Jeanne LaBerge (married 1 Jul 1967)




Franklin. The photo was taken on 31 October 2015.

New Web Site Addition...

Ancestry.com has added hundreds of thousands of Wills and Probate records to their web site covering the entire country. If you subscribe to Ancestry.com you can access the date from home. If you do not subscribe to Ancestry.com you can still access the data but you will have to

do it from your local library or LDS Family History Center Library.



Click on Card Catalog and then in the TITLE box enter the State followed by Wills.

I checked several wills and probate records in Wisconsin, Minnesota, New York, and Vermont and found quite a bit of information including hand-written Last Wills.

Newspaper Archives...

Another great source for research that you can access from home is a site containing newspaper archives for most of the United States but especially for Wisconsin. Go to Badger Link at the following address:

http://badgerlink.dpi.wi.gov/

Click on I'm a Genealogist and then select Access Newspaper Archives. Scroll down and select Wisconsin. Scroll down and select Racine. That will give you access to Racine and Racine County newspapers from 1842-1977. Note that that 1842-year is not an error.

Next enter a surname and click on search. I entered Heck and got 20,533 connections. I then entered Robert J Heck and got 29 results. By clicking on any of the 29 newspapers you will get the actual newspaper page on which the name appears.

When you first enter Badger link you may be asked for your library card number or in some cases just the name of your local Wisconsin library.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Heck, 2225 Harriet St., and the bridegroom is the son of Mrs. Irene Johnson, Kenosha.

Dolores Heck was maid of honor and Bernadette Markson, Jo Slinon and Margaret Noe were bridesmaids. Mary Kay Heck was junior bridesmaid and Donna Jean Heck was flower girl. The bride wore ice blue satin with a full train and an ice blue veil caught to a jeweled calot. The bridal flowers were white orchids and mums. The bride's attendants wore taffeta gowns of ice blue and rose and carried carnations.

Ted Williamson was best man and Jay Serpe, Richard Heck and Robert Heck were ushers. The bride's brothers, Eugene and Clarence Jr., served the mass and John Balestrieri was soloist. The bride, daughter of Mr. And Mrs. Nick Catrine, 3343 Douglas Ave., appeared in white Chantilly lace and nylon net over satin, with tiered lace skirt extending in a full train. Pearls and iridescent sequins trimmed the bodice. A lace helmet studded with seed pearls secured her fingertip veil, and she carried red roses, white pompons and stephanotis.

Identical gowns of nylon net and allover lace were worn by the bridal aides, Connie Catrine as maid of honor in yellow, MaryvJane Clementi, Delores Heck and Marion Clementi as bridesmaids, Mary Kay Heck, junior bridesmaid, Ann Catrine and Donna Heck, flower girls, all in pastel green. Matching half-hats completed their ensembles. Terry Lynn Catrine, flower girl, wore a miniature bridal outfit, and Thomas Clementi served as ring bearer.

Attending the bridegroom, son of Mr. And Mrs. Clarence Heck, 2225 Harriet St., were Larry Heck as best man, Tony Clementi, Charles Franchino and Frank Rallo as ushers.
