
This photo at left is of Johann Lemke 1863-1924 and his wife. Louise C. Graumann 1864-1958. They are the great-great Grandparents of Lauren and Grace. Johan was born in Newton, Manitowoc County, Wisconsin.

Louise was born in Sheboygan, Wisconsin.


The photo at top right is of Adolph Gustav Graumann 1835-1915, who was the father of Louise C. Graumann. Adolph Gustav was married to Louise C. Carstens 1832-1867. Adolph Gustav and Louise C. Carstens are the great–great–great grandparents of Lauren and Grace.



Photos of Louise C. Carstens were not found on the internet. Since she died in 1876, it is unlikely that she ever had her picture taken.



The photo above is of Johann Ernest Wilhelm Carstens 1789-1887 and his wife, Anna Gaetjen 1800-1888. They are the great–great–great–great grandparents of Lauren and Grace.




Meet Your Cousins...

Elvia and Laurence were married in Milwaukee on 16 April 1913. They were married twice and divorced twice according to an article in the Milwaukee Journal-

Sentinel dated 20 NOV 1928: "Divorces in Milwaukee: Elvia from Laurence Heck, for the second time. They were first married in 1913, divorced and remarried in 1924."

In 1905, Elvia was living with her parents, Arthur and Ada, and her siblings, Gladys, Vivian, Ruth, Vernon, and Beulah, at Oshkosh, Winnebago County, Wisconsin. After her divorce she married Oscar J. Gebhardt.



"Mrs. Oscar Gebhardt, N. Milwaukee St., has announced the engagement of her daughter, Miss Dorothy Mae Heck to Ralph R. Ihlenfeld, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Ihlenfeld, W. Hampton Avenue." Milwaukee Journal Monday, 13 March 1939.

Following is an article that I found in an old newspaper from 1895, while doing some research. Note that it works for a man or a woman.


"To Tell Girl's Age"

"Here's a sure way to find out a woman's age without her actually telling you. Ask her to take the number of the month in which she was born. (January is one, February is two, December is 12, etc.) Multiply that number by two. To this resultant number tell her to add five and multiply by fifty. To this number she must add her present

age, and from the sum subtract 365, the number of days in a year."

"Ask her to give you the last result. She has not let you see any of the figures that have gone before. You take this last figure and add 115 to it. This gives you a number of three or four figures. The two figures to the right will be her age. The other figure or figures, to the left, will be the number of the month in which she was born. It always works."

In my case the final number was 1278, and it is correct. I am 78 years old and I was born in December, the 12th month.



From the Newspapers...

The photo above, right, appeared in the Sunday, July 31, 1988 issue of the Racine Journal Times. Robert Gerald Heck, 1909-1995, was the longest serving City Councilman in the history of the City of Racine, Wisconsin.

From the Racine Advocate News 1867, Village Directory, Peter McNulty ran a saloon in Kansasville, Racine County, Wisconsin. It was located on the west side of Main Street, two lots south of the railroad tracks. His residence was at the same location. See next page.

Small World...

I was doing some research for a genealogy presentation I'm scheduled to give on October 9, 2019, and I made an interesting discovery. The subject of my talk is about a web site called Find-a-Grave located at http://findagrave.com

The site is free to use and it contains millions of tombstone images and names of people in the United States. My research was intended to show that other countries are included in Find-a-Grave. I searched for St. Agatha Catholic Church Cemetery in Alendorf, Kreis Euskirchen, Nordrhein-Westfalen, Germany.

The reason that I chose St. Agatha is because that is the church in our ancestral home where the Heck family lived. I had uploaded data on several of our ancestors whom I knew were buried in that cemetery.

Now you have to keep in mind that Alendorf is a very small village with a population of about 250 people. The following shows how small a world we live in today.

When I got to the Find-a-Grave site for Alendorf there were other entries besides the few that I had entered. There were four names that I had entered with the name Heck. There were several entered, with the name Lenz or Lentz. Those were entered by Myron Bohn, who was a classmate of mine at St. Catherine's High School in Racine. Myron is a retired banker now living in Janesville, Wisconsin. What is really interesting is that members of the Lenz/Lentz family came to Racine County, Wisconsin with our Johann Heck family in 1853.


The third group entered, were entered by Mary Rebarchik. They included Wilhelm Schaefer, Magdalena Hecken, Hilger Schmidt, and Anna Maria Schmitz. All four of them are our relatives. What really makes this a small world is that Mary Rebarchik belongs to our MPAFUG computer genealogy group and is also a volunteer at the Family History Center in Hales Corners, Wisconsin. My cousin, Cheryl Ann Heck and I are both volunteers at the Family History Center.

We will need to do some more research to show how Mary Rebarchik is related to our branches of the family.



The picture at top right shows Gloria's great grandfather, Peter Johan Olsen, born on 14 October 1848 at Halsted, Lolland, Maribo County, Denmark. He died on 19 February 1941 at Marshfield, Wood County, Wisconsin. He is bur-



ied at Holway, Taylor County, Wisconsin, near his home. The picture above shows him plowing his farm field with a two horsepower hand plow.



The photo above shows Peter Johan Olsen feeding the chickens on his farm at Holway, Wisconsin.

This photo on the next page shows Peter Johan Olsen going to town for groceries in his one horse buggy.



"SERVICES ARE HELD FOR PETER J. OLSEN"

"Peter J. Olsen, 92, pioneer resident of the town of Holway for 40 years and of the town of Medford the past 21 years, died at Marshfield Feb 19, 1941 after a month's illness. Funeral services were held from the Medford funeral home Saturday afternoon, Feb. 22, at 1:30 o'clock, with the Rev. R. W. Mueller officiating. Interment was in the Holway Lutheran cemetery.


Mr. Olson was born in Denmark, Oct. 14, 1848. He came to this country April 20, 1862, and spent a few years in and around Waukesha, before coming to the town of Holway in May of 1873. He married Mary Fiedler in Waukesha Oct. 9, 1881. The couple homesteaded a quarter section in the town of Holway, making a farm from what was then wild timber land. Only a trail led to Medford from their homestead, making it necessary to carry in all supplies by hand.

The deceased held different school and town offices. He was the first chairman of the town of Holway, holding that office from 1888 to 1898. He was then elected to the office of town clerk for three years. He was again chairman in 1918 and 1919, until he sold the farm and moved to a smaller farm near Medford. Mr. Olson also took part in the organization of the first creamery in 1900. He was also an active member of the Taylor County Fair association in later years. Three daughters survive. They are Mrs. Caroline Burmaster of Appleton; Miss Ella Olson of Medford and Mrs. Jake Klimeck of Stetsonville. There are also nine grandchildren living. Pallbearers were Carl Nelson, Eric Carlson, Axel Kohlin, Albert Olsen, Gilbert Jensen and George Meyer. Mr. and Mrs. Joe Konecny Jr. and sons attended the funeral."



The photo above shows Gladys Burmaster LaBerge at a Cities Service gas station. Note the price of gasoline back then. The sign above her head shows Gas 14.5 cents, State tax 4 cents and Federal tax 1.5 cents per gallon. The total is 20 cents per gallon. Note however it was illegal to pump your own gasoline so attendants would fill your car up, check the oil and wash the windshield.

The photo on the next page shows Peter Johan Olsen and Mary Justa Wilhelmina Fiedler, 1855-1916, on their wedding day, 9 October 1881.



These are Gloria's great grandparents or Lauren and Grace Heck's great-great-great grandparents.

From the Newspapers

The following obituary was found in the 30 August 1936 issue of the Waushara Argus newspaper. Lawrence McNulty, son of Peter McNulty and Patience Burgess, was born in 1861 at Brighton, Racine County, Wisconsin. At the age of 14 he moved to Waushara County, Wisconsin and by 1880 was working on the John Christie farm at Springwater, Waushara County. The fol-

lowing year he married Clara Christie, subject of the obituary. Note that Lawrence changed his name to McNelty and was known as Larry.

"Mrs. McNelty Dies"

"Clara Christie McNelty was born March 18, 1859, near Silver Lake, in the town of Springwater, the fourth daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Christie.

She grew to womanhood in the vicinity and attended the common schools, then attended the Normal school and later taught school for several years.

She was married to Larry McNelty, August 14, 1881. To them were born two sons: John, who died in infancy, and Robert, who survives her. Six years ago, after the death of Mr. McNelty, she bought a home in Wild Rose and moved in from the farm, three miles east of the village, where she lived until her death on Friday, August 14th, 1936. Mrs. McNelty has lived her entire life in this community.

She leaves to mourn her passing: one son, Robert, of Denver, Colorado, and six grandchildren: Mrs. Janet Roberts, Wausau; Mrs. Clara Grayson, and Mrs. Kathryn Grayson, Racine; Mrs. Roberta Moran, Mexico City; Mrs. Patience Christiansen, Denver, Colorado; Mrs. Prudence Rockman, Clintonville; Robert Reed McNelty, Denver, Colorado; also eight great-grandchildren and two sisters; Mrs. Jane Clark, Chicago, and Mrs. Adelaide McLennon, Park Ridge, Illinois, and a host of friends who will miss her congenial personality."

"Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the home and from the Methodist church where she was a faithful member, the Rev. R.R. Holliday officiating. A beautiful profusion of flowers expressed the sympathy and esteem of her many friends. During the service 'The Old Rugged Cross," "When They Ring Those Golden Bells," and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" were sung by Mrs. R.R. Holliday, Mrs. Wilford Urban, V.E. Wensel and Robert Owens. Pallbearers were John Smith, Oscar Holt, Lewis Protheroe, Hugh Young and John Protheroe. Burial was made in the Howe cemetery.

Those from away who attended the services were: Robert F. McNelty, Denver, Co.; Mrs. Jennie Clark and Mr. and Mrs. Sid Bonneville, Chicago; Mrs. Addie McLennon, Park Ridge, ILL.; Mr. and Mrs. M.L. Roberts and Donald McLennon and family of Wausau; Mr. and Mrs. Frank Grayson, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Grayson, Racine; Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Rockman, Clintonville; Mrs. Adam Dibble, Antioch, Ill., and Mrs. Maud Neuville, St. Louis, Missouri."
