The document above is the World War I draft registration of Robert Steven Heck, my grandfather. He was 38 years old and was employed as a bartender at a bar located at 1300 North Main Street in Racine, Wisconsin. He was living at 901 Hamilton Street in Racine at the time of registration in 1917. Within a few years he was living at 2704 Charles Street where he died of an aneurysm in 1923. A short time later his family was living at 1335 North Main Street in Racine, where his son Edward Heck died in 1931 at the age of 15 years. Ironically, 1335 North Main Street is at the opposite end of the block from the tavern where Robert Steven Heck was employed.

At right are photos taken in about 2018 showing top to bottom: the tavern at 1300 North Main Street, the home at 2704 Charles Street and the home at 1335 North Main Street. My dad, Robert Gerald Heck and I were able to tour the home on North Main Street many years ago. My dad

pointed out each of the rooms where he and his siblings slept.







New Information on the Children of Benajah Burgess.

While researching the Internet for a presentation that I will be making to our genealogy group, MPAFUG, I uncovered some new information about the children of Benajah Burgess. Benajah was born in 1761 and died in 1830. Benajah was my 4th Great Grandfather. He was born in Rhode Island, lived in Voluntown, Connecticut, and in Hoosick, New York and Vermont. He is buried at the Walloomsac Methodist Episcopal Cemetery (ME Cemetery) in Rensselaer County, New York. His land in Vermont is where the battle of Bennington was fought during the American Revolution.

Buried at West Exeter Cemetery, West Exeter, Otsego County, New York. Here is a photo of her tombstone:




8. John Burgess

11. Peleg Burgess



12. Zilpha Burgess Bacon

Born 1809, at Hoosick, Rensselaer County, New York, Died 15 APR 1885, at Sunderland, Bennington County, Vermont.

Married George W Bacon 1802-1865. Buried at Lawrence Cemetery, Sunderland, Bennington County, Vermont. Here is a photo of her tombstone:



If you look at the tombstones for Nancy Burgess Potter and John Burgess on the previous pages you can see that someone used a chemical of some sort to be able to read the letters on the stone. That person has caused severe damage to the stones which will shorten the life of them. It is against the law to use any solution on a tombstone and the person who did it to these stones could be fined a great deal.

If you are ever in a cemetery and have a hard time reading a stone, there are a few simple steps that you can take without damaging the stone. One of the easiest is to take a piece of aluminum foil and hold it so that the sunlight reflects at an angle on the stone. That will cast a shadow of the letters allowing you to easily read and photograph the inscription.

A second method is to spray distilled water on the surface. That will make the inscription stand out long enough for you to read and photograph the inscription. Distilled water does not contain any minerals that could cause damage to the stone.

Another interesting fact about the Burgess children is that they sure liked to marry spouses from the Potter and Matteson families.

From the Newspapers...

The Antioch News, Antioch, Illinois Thursday, January 27, 1949. **Pioneer Resident Dies Wednesday Night.** "Mrs. Loretta Dibble, 82, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ralph Fields, last night, Wednesday, January 26. Mrs. Dibble had been ill for a long time preceding death.

She was born at Kansasville, Wisconsin, on September 15, 1866, and most of her long life was spent in this community. Her husband preceded her in death in 1936.


Beside Mrs. Fields, she is survived by a son, Sylvester Dibble, of Salem, Wisconsin, two grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The body is at the Strang Funeral home, but no funeral arrangements have been made as yet."

Note: Loretta was the daughter of Peter McNulty and Patience Burgess. When she died in 1949, she was the last of 13 children to pass away.

Loretta was married on 19 Feb 1887 at the house of the rector of St. Francis church at Brighton, Kenosha Co. Wis. The witnesses were James Henry Heck and Mary Ann Heck. The marriage was thought to be a mixed marriage as Adam was not Catholic. Loretta and Adam were found living in Bristol, Wisconsin in the 1910 census.

She is buried at the Hickory Union Cemetery, Antioch, Lake Co., IL.
