

An Autobiography of Gary M. Heck

I am quite proud of my older brother, Gary, who was selected to be the first veteran to present his story as part of the Chickasaw Point Veteran Stories. Here is his story as he wrote it.



Story 1 Personal Story by Gary Heck



I was born in Racine, Wisconsin in 1938. I attended a Catholic grade school and graduated from St. Catherine's High School in 1956. I went to college for one year, but I actually spent more

time in the pool hall than I did in classes. I had no idea what I wanted to do with my life. A couple of my high school friends were going to enlist in the Army and go to Germany. It sounded like a good idea to me, so I enlisted in June of 1957 for three years. I was sent to basic



training, advanced basic training and unit training at Fort Hood, Texas. I was assigned to the 1st Armored Rifle Battalion, 54 Infantry, Combat Command C, and 4th Armored Division.

After six months of training our unit was sent to Heilbronn, Germany where I was assigned as a Rifleman in the 3rd Squad, 3rd Platoon, and Company D. After about one year I was an acting Sergeant. I later got promoted to a real Sergeant. While in Germany, I was sent to forward observer school where I learned how to direct artillery. I also earned the EIB (expert infantryman badge). There were rather strict requirements that needed to be met. Only about 1 in 10 meets the requirements. I also taught map reading classes.

I enjoyed being in Germany because it allowed me to see a lot of Europe. I visited London, Paris, Rome, Geneva, Amsterdam, Venice and Berlin. At that time Germany was divided into East and West Germany. I also went to the Vatican, Belgium, Denmark and Liechtenstein. I also got to "visit" Grafenwoehr, Baumholder, and Hohenfeld all training areas in Germany.

I did get into both West and East Berlin. I was told if I get on a train in Berlin I should make sure it was the U-Bahn and not the S-Bahn. It seems the S-Bahn would go through East Berlin and enter East Germany where, as an American soldier, I would be detained. I do remember West Berlin was mostly rebuilt and almost everything was new. When I was in East Berlin, the main street starting at the Brandenburg gate was brand new and very modern, however if you went one block over, there were still large mounds of rubble and bombed out buildings left from WW2. Speaking about WW2, one of my earliest memories was the end of WW2. I was seven years old and playing baseball when suddenly, car horns were blaring all over the place and factory horns and whistles were going off and everyone was shouting "the war is over, the war is over". Another old memory was that the Japanese were going to invade Racine by landing on the shores of Lake Michigan. We decided that we would meet them on North Beach and stop them. When the war ended and we were not invaded, we figured that they must have heard about us and were too scared to try an invasion.

Memories from my service include running up every hill in Germany, some really cold days riding in an Armored Personnel Carrier and the time someone mistakenly sent an actual alert. We had practice alerts about once a month. We thought that we were going to war until we found out it was a mistake. I was Honorably Discharged from Fort Sheridan, Illinois in April 1960.

After my discharge I went to work for Walker Manufacturing in Racine as a production controller. Walkers made tail and exhaust pipes. My job was to decide when and how many pipes we built. I did this for ten years. Walkers started to move production out of Racine about that time.




I always had an interest in law enforcement, so I applied to the Racine County Sheriff's Department and was hired in January of 1971 as a deputy. I spent 23 years as a deputy before retiring at the end of 1993. I served as a Narcotic Investigator, was promoted

to Lieutenant, and served as the 3rd Shift Commander, the Administrative Lieutenant, and Investigative Lieutenant and then to Operation's Captain. I went back to college and graduated from Carthage College Magna Cum Laude with a degree in Criminal Justice and Sociology. I then went to Webster College and earned a Master's Degree in Public Administration and also in Administration of Justice. I graduated from the FBI National Academy in 1983.

When I left Washington, DC it was 55 degrees, when I landed in Detroit it was 32 degrees, and when I landed in Milwaukee it was 11 degrees. The next morning, in Racine it hit the all-time low in Racine County of -33 below zero with a wind chill of about -80 below. When I woke up that next morning, I noticed a shine on the north bedroom wall. It turned out to be ¹/₄ inch of ice on the inside wall. That was the moment we decided we were moving south when we retired.

I then moved to Chickasaw Point in 1994 and love it. I married Carol in October 1994. We each have two daughters. I always believed that everyone should contribute to their community. At one time I was on the POA Board for over three



years, and I was also on the Marina Board for fifteen years with six of those as President. I have been President of the Men's Club for two terms and President of the Men's Golf for three years. I also served on numerous committees and projects. It was a rewarding experience for me. I thank everyone for allowing me the privilege of serving Chickasaw Point.

On the upper right side of this page is a photo from our album of the Henningfeld side of our family. Shown is Clara Sibilla Elizabeth Stratmann the wife of Henry Frank Henningfeld from Burlington, Racine County, Wisconsin. The Christening record for Clara Sibilla Stratmann was found in the St. Antonius Catholic Church record of Geithe, Kr Hamm, Germany. The record shows that she was born on 14 November 1847, and was christened on 21 November 1847. Godparents were Clara Guthoff, Sibilla Peiler,



and Casper Schulte.

Clara departed Germany from the port of Bremen on the ship Hermann. She arrived at the port of New York on 15 June 1868. Her home was listed as the city of Hamm. She traveled alone from Germany to Wisconsin.

Marriage Record: 6 May 1873: From the church record at St. Thomas Catholic Church at Waterford, Racine County, Wisconsin: "Die 6 Mai in Matrimonum conjunxi: Henricum Heningfeld cum Clara Strattman, nulto obstante impedimento. Testes Fuere Carlos Strattman et Gmil Heningfeld."

Translation: " On the 6 May 1873 in matrimony are joined together Henry Heningfeld with Clara Strattman without obstacles or impediments. Witnessed by Charles (Carlos) Strattman and William Heningfeld."

Clara's mother, Anna Maria Elizabeth nee Guthoff, Brüggemann, Stratmann, Heitkemper, her brother, Charles (Carlos), and her halfbrother, Henry Fred Heitkemper, arrived in New York on the same ship (Hermann) on 19 June 1869, about one year after Clara had arrived. Yes, Clara's mother was married three times. Her first husband died in 1844, a year or so after their marriage. Her second husband died in 1858, 12 years after they were married. Her last husband died in 1911, 13 years after his marriage to Clara's mother.

What do I get with a Basic MyHeritage subscription?

Signing up to MyHeritage is completely free and allows you to build your own family site. Basic sites are free to create. With your Basic family site, you can add up to 250 individuals in the family tree(s) you build. If you add photos and scanned documents to the family site, the limit of storage space is 500 MB.

If you stay with a Basic subscription and created your family tree in Family Tree Builder, you will be able to sync it with your online family site as long as it doesn't go over the limit of 250 individuals.

If your tree grows and you need more storage, you can upgrade your family site at any time with a site subscription.

Here is a bit of history behind the Heck Family Picnic. The Heck family picnic was started by the grandchildren of Henry Heck 1839-1920 and Mary Ann McNulty 1844-1912.


There were eight branches of the Heck family, each branch headed up by the children of Henry Heck. The eight branches and where they lived were:

James Heck – Burlington; Mary Ann Heck Grostuck – Milwaukee; John Heck – Waterford; Mathias Heck – Thompsonville; Elizabeth Heck Plucker – Waterford; Robert Steven Heck - Racine; Eva Clara Heck (never married) - Milwaukee; Laurence Heck – Milwaukee.


The early picnics started in Burlington, Wisconsin at Browns Lake shortly after World War II. We still have old 8mm movies taken by my parents, Mary and Robert Heck of the 1947 Heck Family Picnic at Burlington. In 1948 the Heck picnic was held in Racine at the home of Robert Gerald Heck on Jones Avenue. A family softball game was held just down the street at Douglas Park.

The Polio epidemic hit Wisconsin hard and the Heck picnics were cancelled. In 1969 they were resumed for the next 55 years.

From 1969 through 2024, the picnics were held at various places in Racine, including Lincoln Field, Wind Point Lighthouse, and The Leisure Center near Wind Point.



The photo above shows Bill Heck with his mother, Gloria, during a trip that Gloria and Bob Heck made with Bill and Michelle in June, 2023 to Western Canada. The best part is that Bill and Gloria were wearing their Rush Tribute shirts. Bill is the lead guitarist in the Rush Tribute Project band. The Canadian Rockies make for a great background for this, my favorite picture of the entire trip.



Daughters of the American Revolution list Benajah Burgess as having served in the Revolutionary War. Benajah is my 4th great grandfather.

Peter McNulty finally found on a passenger list arriving in St. John, New Brunswick, Canada in 1834.

After years of searching I finally found Peter McNulty arriving in North America. The transcribed record shows his name as Peter McAnally rather than Peter McNulty. In Irish records I have often found McNulty listed as McAnulty. In hand written records the letters lt are often misinterpreted as ll (two L's). The reason for this is that crossing the letter t is often not done or is done so lightly that one is not sure if the letter is a lower case L or a T.

The record shows that Peter was 28, born about 1808, and he arrived in St. John, New Brunswick in 1834. The source publication code is 6637.17. The source biography is Passengers To New Brunswick: The Custom House Records – 1833, 34, 37, & 38. Saint John, N.B.: The New Brunswick Genealogical Society 1987, 483p.

This is a near perfect match for our Peter McNulty except for the spelling of his last name. The next step is to find how he arrived in Boston. He either arrived in Boston by land or by a smaller ship.

Peter McNulty is my great-great grandfather who married Patience Burgess. Their daughter, Mary Ann McNulty, married Henry Heck in 1869 at Brighton, Kenosha County, Wisconsin.

Nearly everyone named Heck who can trace their ancestors back to Racine, Burlington, or Waterford, Wisconsin is a descendant of Peter McNulty and Patience Burgess. ********

James Heck, 73, Dies After Short Illness

James Heck, 78, son of Henry Heck, Civil war weteran, died at 11:30 p. m. Wednesday. Mr. Heck had been a resident of Burlington for many years. He was born Nov. 1, 1869, on a

He was born Nov. 1, 1869, on a farm in the town of Brighton, Kenosha county, and spent his early life in that vicinity, later moving to Burlington. His wife, the former, Wilhelmina Hoerneman, died in 1919. Mr. Heck, a painter by trade, had been in poor health for the past 10 years, but was not confined to his bed until a week prior to his death. He was a member of St. Mary's Catbolic church, and of the Holy Name society of that parish. Friends will gather at the McCarthy funeral home at 8 p.m. Friday to pray the resary.

Friday to pray the rosary. Surviving Mr. Heck are four children, Ray Heck and Herbert Heck, Burlington, Mrs. Nic Pier, Racine, and Corp. Joseph Heck, at Camp Shelby, Mils., who will be home for the funeral. He also is survived by two sisters, Miss Eva Heck and Mrs. allfred Plucker, Waterford; a brother, Laurence Heck, Milwaukees a cousin, Miss Anna Hugenin, and seven grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday in St. Mary's church. Burial will be in St. Mary's cemetery.
