DNA Testing for Family Research

Many of our readers know that DNA testing is a tool that genealogists use to learn more about their ancestral lineage, and about how they are related.

The way that it works is a person orders a DNA kit from one of many resources. Three popular ones in the genealogy world are **Family Tree DNA**, **Ancestry DNA**, and **MyHeritage DNA**. Another popular source is **23andME**, however it is used more by the general public who may be interested in non-genealogy questions such as, Am I allergic to coffee?

When you receive the DNA test kit you take a special cotton swab and rotate it several times on the inside of your mouth in the cheek area. The swab is then inserted into a plastic tube with a special liquid in it. The tube is sealed and mailed back to the company. Several weeks later you will get the results. DNA kits go on sale all the time. Prices range from \$30 to \$100.

I had my DNA tested by Ancestry DNA operated by Ancestry.com. I had subscribed to Ancestry and already had my genealogy research on their system. When I got the results back it showed where my ancestors came from by country. It also showed how much German ancestry I had as well as Czech, England, and Ireland. It listed a huge number of people that I was related to going back seven or eight generations. It even showed that I was related to Cheryl Ann Heck since she is the Daughter of my First Cousin.

The report went on to show that our common pro-genitor was Robert Steven Heck, my grand-

father and Cheryl's great-grandfather. Technically that means that Cheryl is my first cousin once removed. This means that she and I are one generation apart.

My report lists my DNA matches to 20,176 different people. That could take a few years to evaluate. For that reason most genealogists usually concentrate on matches to the third or fourth generation.

DNA testing can also be done on animals such as dogs.




Here is a photo of my grand-dog, Maggie on the right running with her sister Mabel on the left. Maggie was adopted by my son and daughter-inlaw, Bill and Michelle from West Bend, Wisconsin.

They decided to have Maggie's DNA tested to find out what mixture of pedigree she had. They knew when they adopted Maggie that she was born in Texas and that she was brought to a humane society facility in Wisconsin. To their surprise they found out that she had a sister, Mabel, who was also adopted by a family in West Bend. They also learned that Maggie and Mabel had a brother who was adopted by a family in Watertown, Wisconsin.

The two West Bend families got together and Maggie and Mabel had a great time running together as they were reunited. They clearly knew that they were sisters.

Civil War Diary



Shown here is a page from a hand written diary from a soldier in Company F of the 19th Wisconsin Voluntary Infantry from 1864.

Of particular interest are entries written on May 15th and 16th.

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"15th Sunday. Marched to Drewey's Bluffs and camped under a cover of woods 10 miles from Richmond."

"16th Monday. Morning Foggy. Rebs thoroughly reinforced from Richmond during the night and morning. Heavy attacks on our right and left. We are obliged to fall back with considerable loss. So foggy we could not see the Rebs till they were upon us. The hardest day that I having seen. The wounded are passing by me all from the loss in our right. This day 6 killed 40+ wounded and missing."

My great Grandfather, Henry Heck, was one of the men wounded that day at the battle of Drewey's Bluff. He served in Company F of the 19th Wisconsin Voluntary Infantry.

The hand written diary was one that I had not seen before. I had seen a printed report that was part of the regimental day report on the battle. ********

From the Christmas Photo Album...





1931. He is the son of Louis Josef Sanders 1827-1894 and Anna Maria Francesca Henningfeld 1823-1893.

Anna Maria Francesca Henningfeld, born in Olfen, Germany, is the sister of our Franz Arnold Henningfeld. Franz Arnold Henningfeld is my great-great-grandfather so his sister, Anna Maria Francesca Henningfeld is my great-greatgrandaunt. Our common ancestors are Johann Henrich Wilhelm Henningfeld and Maria Catharina Bücker Struman.

Mrs. Gertrude Zeren Burial services were held last Saturday morning at Fairfax for

Saturday morning at Fairiax Io Mrs. Gertrude Zeren who passed ulm, Wednesday, March 28th, after an illness of five days from heart trouble. The funeral was held at St. Andrew's Catholic church at 9 o'clock with Rev. J. J. Georgen officiating. Interment was made in the Catholic cemetery at Fairfax.

Gertrude Starken was born Brocket, Germany, December 2, 1853, and came to America with her parents at the age of eleven years, coming to Dahlgren township, Carver county, Minn., where they lived with a friend for a short time and then bought a farm in Laketown township, in the same county where she grew to womanhood. She was married to Feter Zeren on October 29, 1874, at Swan Lake, Nicollet county, where they lived until a year later when they moved to St. George and lived there for five years and then spent nine years at Chaska before moving to Fairfax. While living there Mr. Zeren died and a few years later Mrs. Zeren went to Wabasso to live with her sons and daughters and also lived with her daughter, Mrs. Johan-neck of Redwood Falls. In January, 1928, she entered the old folks' home in New Ulm and died at the Loretta Hospital March 28, after an illness of five days with heart trouble.

She is survived by nine children as follows: Mrs. Chas. Johanneck of Redwood Falls; John Zeren, Nels C. Zeren, Mrs. E. Weldon, all of Wabasso; Fhilip and Elizabeth Zeren of New England, N. D.; William Zeren of Boulder, Colo.; Gertrude of Minneapolis; and George Zeren of Milwaukee, Wis., to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother. She is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Ben Straumann of Fairfax, and Mrs. Elizabeth Zins of Fulda, Minn., twentynine grandchildren and one great grandchild. All of the children were present at the funeral excepting William Zeren of Boulder, Colo.

town, S. D.; John Heck, Mrs. Jos. Heck and daughter, Margaret, and son, George, of Clements; Mrs. Geo. Walter and son, Arthur, Mrs. Margaret Heck, Mr. and Mrs. John Schweiss, Miss Mary Sons, Mrs. D. Issue 123 of Our Family News Letter from December 2023, went into the history of the Zeren family. The obituary was found in November 2024 and is copied in this issue.



Briefly, Johann Heck married Susannah Zeren, a widow with seven children, in 1856, shortly after the death of his first wife, Anna Barbara Schaefer. Peter Zeren, one of the children of Susannah, mar-

ried Gertrude Stacken at Swan Lake, Minnesota. Gertrude is shown here as a young girl in Minnesota. Peter Zeren worked for Johann Heck for a year or so at Swan Lake, Brighton Township, Nicollet County, Minnesota.


Sharon has been bitten by the genealogy bug and has been busy discovering new things about her family. The most significant find is that J D Vance and Sharon Dianne Bellomy are 2nd cousins 1 time removed.

In 2024, J D Vance is the Vice President elect of the United States. J D and Sharon can trace their ancestry back to Christopher Columbus (Lum) Bellomy (1873-1916). J D Vance is the great-great grandson of Lum Bellomy and Sharon is the great-granddaughter of Lum Bellomy.

Sharon's father is Goebel Bellomy. The article outlines the story of her father who was a paratrooper during World War II. He was captured on the first day of the invasion of Sicily.




This picture shows L-R: Barney Joseph Stanitis, John Mikel, and Robert Gerald Heck. The picture was taken in about 1948 following a fishing trip to Puckaway Lake, Wisconsin. Barney was a friend of the family and John Mikel was my maternal grandfather. My Dad is shown at far right. I count 33 northern pike hanging on the fence. I'm not sure what the possession limit was back then but I would guess that they pushed the limit. I hate to think how long it took them to clean that many fish because none of them knew how to filet a fish.

Shown at Upper Right is an image of the death certificate for Anna Maria Elizabeth Guthoff Brüggemann Stratman Heitkemper. She was the mother of Clara Stratman Henningfeld. Anna Maria Elizabeth was born in 1819 in Germany and died on 30 November 1893 at Waterford, Racine County, Wisconsin. She was my greatgreat-grandmother.

Her maiden name was Guthoff. She was married three times, first to Johann Brüggemann in 1843, he died in 1844, second to Anton Stratman in 1846, he died in 1858, and third to Frederich Heitkemper in 1859, he died in 1911.

The death certificate was one that I had not seen before. I found it while doing a search for Heitkemper on the Find-A-Grave web site. The two dates at the bottom of the certificate appear to be incorrect, but are likely not. The Year shown is 1895, which is just under two years after the death. Often the parish priest reported any deaths to the County. In 1893 they were required to report a death within two years.



The image above shows the christening records for Lilly Marie and Rose Margaret Heck born on 31 July 1915. Lilly died in 1916 and Rose died in 1917. They were the twin daughters of Robert Steven Heck and Margaret <u>Isabella</u> Henningfeld. This is the only record that I have found that showed Margaret's middle name as Isabella rather than Friedrica.
